## **PET WASTE**

Animal waste is a water pollutant and a public health hazard, especially in public areas and multi-family developments that often have the highest concentrations of pet waste. Factors affecting the amount of animal waste in the Greenfield Lake watershed include 1) the population of stray dogs and cats, 2) the population of resident ducks and geese fed by humans, and 3) compliance of pet owners to city codes regarding pet waste. Pet waste should be either buried at least 5 inches below ground or sealed in an airtight container and placed in a garbage receptacle. There are alternative ways to dispose of waste, including digesters or pet waste receptacle stations.
